

Over the last nearly 50 years, I have been privileged to have been a Licenced Lay Minister in the Church of England. During this time I have preached countless sermons and led/assisted in many services too.

I have also been fortunate to have served in three dioceses (Coventry, Chester and Liverpool) in many Churches too.

I have always felt a calling to undertake more than just attending regular worship even though this has always been a vital part of my life.

As youngster I worshipped in a small Parish in Pwllgwaun in Llandaff Diocese where over a period of years I served as an Altar Boy and Server as well as reading regularly at services. I felt a real calling to ministry I was still at school and thought I was being called to Ordained Ministry; I went as far as applying, and being accepted in a Theological College after Sixth Form.

However it was during my time as a Sixth Former that I gradually became aware that God was calling me to the Ministry of Teaching. This was reinforced when at Easter 1965, only weeks after my decision to do so, I applied and gained a place at a Church of England Teachers' Training College, Culham College which was part of Oxford University. In fact I gained the last place to study Divinity (Theology).

So a new chapter of my life started and during the three years at Culham I became more and more convinced that the path I was pursuing was what God was leading me to do. I prayed earnestly and regularly and in Bible Studies and Prayer Groups and so in September 1965 gained my first Teaching Post in Rugby.

Gill and I had met when we both applied for jobs in Berkshire but when she gained a position in Reading and I in Rugby our lives seemed to destined for long periods apart. This was not to be so as we married in November 1965 and we made our home together in Rugby. Here we settled into a super Church (St Andrew's) and we again enjoyed the worship, friendship and fellowship there.

After a couple of years I expressed the feeling to our Parish Priest that I had a calling to the Ministry of Reader. This was quickly followed up and I was Admitted and Licensed as a Reader at St John's Berkswell, Coventry on 16 May 1970. I preached my first sermon as a Reader on 17 May 1970 in one of the Daughter Churches, St Philip's.

From then I went to many Churches, mainly in small villages, as I had a Diocesan Licence. We continued to worship at St Andrew's then St Peter's, another of the Daughter Churches where we stayed until we moved to Warrington in 1986.

I had a post as Senior Master at Grappenhall Hall School – a Residential School for boys with Emotional and Behavioural Difficulties. We joined St Wilfrid's Church and I was Licensed as a Reader in Chester Diocese, where I served for a number of years.

Later on we moved to Warrington Parish Church and have been here ever since.

Throughout my life I have always tried to follow the path which God in His wisdom has chosen for me and so it is after much thinking, praying and asking for guidance that it seems to be right time to step down as a Reader which I will do so at the end of July 2019.

I want to thank everyone throughout my time as a Reader for their help, encouragement and prayerful guidance in all the Churches in which I have been honoured to serve, especially everyone here at St Elphin's.

May God in His goodness, bless and keep you in His loving, faithful and unending mercy as He has guided and supported Gill and I during the last 50 years and all the days of our lives.

Church Finances latest update

Over several years many people have left money and given donations to help with maintaining the fabric of St Elphin's parish church. This money is gratefully received and has allowed us to build up a pot of money to keep the church in good order. These funds are restricted for maintenance of the building and cannot be used to meet monthly outgoings. These regularly outgoing include:

Parish Share - which pays for our clergy, monthly salaries, training and pension provision

Gas / Electricity

Insurance - almost £1,000 per month

General / water rates and maintenance on clergy housing

Secretarial and other administrative expenses including printing

Other expenses relating to parish business

I intend to provide brief details of the monthly income and expenditure in the magazine but if anyone would like more details please see me.

Total	£34,799	£38,876

£5,000 of the March income are wedding deposits, the expenditure for these will occur when the wedding takes place. Only a small portion of wedding receipts are available to the church the rest are payable to Organist, choir, and Diocese depending what the couple have paid for.

April income includes £3853 tax reclaim from the inland revenue. Please remember if you pay tax and give your details to Dianne Rothwell the church can reclaim the tax you have paid with no additional cost to you.

Pause for Thought...with Norma Fox

*Seashells and seaweed
In long shiny strands,
Ice cream and donkeys
And fun on the sands*



These words from Margaret Ingall's poem gave me that glorious feeling that 'here comes summer'. Sun and sea and lots of cream teas, lazy hazy days begging us to relax and unwind.

We never tired of visits to the coast with our children and watched delighted as they played on the sands and paddled in the sea and ended the day with a fiesta of ice cream topped with sherbet crystals that popped in your mouth, flavours to suit everyone!

Did you know that ice cream can be traced back to the Roman emperor Nero? Who combined ice from the mountains with fruit toppings. King Tang of China created ice and milk concoctions. Recipes for milk ices and sherbets emerged over time and were service in Italian and French royal courts.

The dessert was imported to the United States and served to guests by such famous people as George Washington and Thomas Jefferson. In 1846 Nancy Johnson patented a hand-cranked freezer that established the basic method of making ice cream which is still used today.

Then in 1904, ice cream cones were invented at the St Louis World Exposition. They appeared when a seller ran out of dishes and improvised by rolling up some waffles.

Today ice cream is available in countless flavours and adored by young and old alike, and I can agree with that!

My children are all grown now with children of their own, and faces still light up with pleasure as they tuck into one of the most delectable treats as they stroll along the sands.

Margaret Ingall ends her poem by reminding us

*And though the world changes,
Of one thing I'm sure –
Such pebble-bright pleasures

Across the world in 2017, Mothers' Union members, acting as volunteers in their local communities, touched the lives of over 750,000 people in 84 countries. They did this as part of their personal commitment to show their faith in action, by reaching out to do what is needed, however small, wherever it is needed, often reaching communities which others struggle to reach. They do this in their own time, using their own resources.

In many of the countries in which we are based, our members are creating safe and secure homes and support for orphans. The children have been orphaned for a number of reasons including war, displacement and sickness. Many of our members come together in their community to support these children, despite having large families themselves. In some areas Mothers' Union groups have built or support their local orphanages and often volunteer at them on a regular basis. Just some of our recent work includes:

- In Aru, DRC Mothers' Union run an orphan care programme which supports 50 orphans and their carers. Members provide training, pastoral support and some financial support for the carers, and organise social events for the orphans
- In Botswana, Mothers' Union run an Orphan Day Care Centre supporting 60 orphaned children between the ages of two and six. About 150 children have since graduated from the centre and are now in formal education. These children return to the centre each week for a progress check, a meal and help with their school work
- In the UK many Mothers' Union members will knit clothing and teddies to send out to orphanages as well as sanitary products.

We place our lives before you, Lord, as an offering. As we do so, we praise you for your unfailing love that accompanies our every thought, word and deed. Grant us room in our lives today to sit at the feet of Jesus – to listen, to distinguish between necessary and superfluous actions, and to praise God for the beneficial, effective outreaches taking place in our communities. Loving Lord, we pray for our many projects and initiatives worldwide. We pray for our volunteering heart, for sustenance and guidance as we consider, establish and implement transforming actions within our communities. Not all of us can do great things but we can do small things with love.

Civray – June 2019

Bonjour mes amis, comment ça va?

Or as they say in England, “Hi everyone.”

Well we have finally done it!! All our goods and chattels (I think in olden days I was probably the chattel!!) safely arrived on 21st May. We made a very short visit back to Warrington in May to complete the sale of our house and to pack everything up. The removal chaps arrived about 8.45 a.m. on Tuesday 14 May, greeting us with a cheery “are you all ready to go?!” No, we said, we are waiting for you to start the packing! Oh no they said we are expecting to just pick up and go! No, no, no, we said, we are paying for a full pack and removal. After a phone call to their office they came back with profuse apologies; the office had made a mistake! The three chaps soon became six and the majority of the packing was just about completed by the end of the day, just a little left to do on Wednesday morning and the loading of the van. I told them not to pack the kettle, mugs and tea bags – but they did – so no brews for anyone after 9.30!!! We waved the van off about 10.45 – it was quite emotional to watch it disappear down Orford Green, leaving us in an almost empty house, just the cleaning gear!

After a final look round to check that nothing had been forgotten, we locked up and set off about mid-day to drop the keys off with the estate agent, stopping at Sainsbury’s on the way for our picnic goodies and we were off!! Just as we were driving into Stockton Heath I remembered we were also supposed to fill the car with fuel at Sainsbury’s! A quick diversion to Morrisons and then we really were off!!! Thank goodness we did not suffer any damage, but the garden got a good watering. I think it was about the same time as the torrential rain in England, we hope none of you suffered any problems.






